a. Completed Research

5. Influence of Enabling and Reinforcing Factors on Reported Compliance with Treatment of Diabetic Patients

Brief: The study examined the influence of enabling and reinforcing factors on reported compliance with treatment of diabetic patients. Using the green predisposing determinants of health related behaviour as conceptual framework, a total of 200 diabetic patients were randomly selected from the Diabetic Clinic of the UCH Ibadan using systematic random sampling techniques. The main research instruments were structured interview and questionnaire. The one-way ANOVA and t-test were used to test related hypotheses at 0.05 level of significance.

2. Mothers' Awareness and Knowledge of the Harmful effect of Female Genital Mutilation in Oyo State

Brief: The research examined mothers' knowledge of the harmful effect of female genital mutilation in Oyo State. The population comprised 4,950 literate and illiterate mothers in the 33 local government area of Oyo State. Simple random sampling of stratified technique was used to select 768 participants out of the study population. A self-developed questionnaire with the reliability coefficient of 0.86 was used to collect the data. The descriptive statistics of frequency counts and percentages and inferential statistics of X^2 was used to analyze the demographic information and test the hypotheses respectively at 0.05 alpha level. The results showed that mothers are aware of FGM but are not knowledgeable about the harmful effects of FGM.

3. Sexual Practice, Attitude and Knowledge of Selected Secondary School Students in Abeokuta Metropolis.

Brief: the study examined sexual health knowledge, attitude and behaviour in relation to human sexuality among selected secondary school students in Abeokuta metropolis Ogun State. Descriptive survey design was used and a sample population of 300 subjects was used for the study. Hypotheses were formulated and tested using descriptive statistics of frequencies and percentages and inferential statistics of X^2 was used to test the hypotheses at 0.05 level of significance. The result of the finding indicated that sexual frequency, pattern of sexuality practices were statistically significant while knowledge of contraception and reproductive biology was low among the participants.

4. Health workers' Opinion about the Impact of Safe Motherhood Programme on the Prevalence of Maternal Mortality

Brief: The study investigated the health workers' opinion about the impact of safe motherhood initiative training programme (life saving skills) on the prevalence of maternal mortality in Adeoyo maternity Hospital Ibadan, Oyo State. Using the purposive sampling technique, a total of 215 nurses, nurse-midwives were selected. A self developed validated questionnaire with 0.98 reliability was used as instrument and data was analyzed by percentages and Chi-square statistics. The results of the study showed that the respondents had significant opinion about safe motherhood initiative programme.

5. Effectiveness of Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC) in Motor Traffic Accident Prevention on Oyo-Ibadan Highway

Brief: the effectiveness of FRSC in prevention of traffic accident on Ibadan-Oyo highway was studied using descriptive survey research design. 311 participants were used as sample for the study. The result of the research showed that 88% of the participants have adequate knowledge of whom the FRSC are. 75% of the participants have performed their role in rescue operation. 70% of the participants agreed that they determine speed limit. 71.8% of the participants disagreed that the FRSC participates in training of drivers. Based on the findings, the following recommendations are made: there should be consultative

meetings of the FRSC with executives of National Road Transport Workers on how to prevent motor traffic accident, there should be jingles on safety education and highway signs must be on the highway. (See Publication 23).

6. Knowledge, Attitude and Determinants of Adolescents Sexual Behaviour among Selected Secondary School Students in Kajola Local Government Area of Oyo State.

Brief: the study examined knowledge, attitude and determinants of adolescents sexual behaviour among selected secondary school students in Kajola Local Government Area of Oyo State. The descriptive survey research design was used. A total of 600 participants were selected for the study. The results showed that students had significant knowledge of reproductive health and contraceptives, and possessed positive attitude towards sexuality. Peer group pressure and poverty were significant determinants of adolescents' sexual behaviour. Recommendations to enhance sex education in secondary schools and that health education should have components of Sexuality education. Also recommended was that family life education be made more popular in Nigerian schools and parents should be sensitized by government to be more responsible to the reproductive health education needs of their children (See Publication 32).

7. Inhibitions to Optimum Utilization of Maternal and Child Health Care Services in Ijebu North Local Government Area of Ogun State.

Brief: the study examined the various inhibitions to optimal utilization of maternal and child health care services by expectant and nursing mothers in Ijebu local Government Area of Ogun State. The variables investigated were whether the level of education, cultural beliefs, socio-economic status, accessibility to health centers and attitudes of health service providers would be inhibitors to optimum utilization of maternal and child healthcare services. Eight political wards in Ijebu North Local Government Area were used for the study.

The statistical analysis showed that all the variables tested were significantly inhibiting the utilization of available maternal and child health care services. Health education in schools should give adequate intention to maternal and child care. Workshops, seminars and health talks should be organized for mother by appropriate authorities (See Publication 3).

8. Gender Differences in the Perception of Culture and Poverty as Causes of Violence against Women among Osun State Workers.

Brief: the purpose of this study is to investigate gender differences in the perception of culture and poverty as causes of violence against women among Osun State workers. The participants for the study consisted of 2,065 male and female workers in Osun State. A self developed, validated questionnaire of (reliability of 0.87) is used to collect the data. Out of the 2,065 that adequately filled the questionnaire, 1,155 (55.9%) are males and 900 females. The study found that there are no significant differences in the perception of male and female workers in Osun State on culture and poverty as causes of violence against women. The researchers therefore recommended intensive education through seminars and campaign to improve awareness level of male and female workers (See Publication 25).

b. In Progress

1. Knowledge, Attitude and Practice of lactating Mothers Attending Postnatal Clinics in Selected Health Care Centres in Oyo State, Nigeria.

The purpose of the study is to examine the knowledge, attitude and practice of lactating mothers attending postnatal clinics in selected health care centres in Oyo State, Nigeria. The descriptive survey research design is to be used for the study. To facilitate the study, nine related hypotheses were formulated using variables of socio-economic status, traditional belief, knowledge level, husband's influence, level of education and attitude and practice of the mothers. Using simple random sampling, the health centres were selected through the fish bowl technique and a questionnaire was formulated as the main instrument for collecting data. Descriptive statistics of frequencies and percentages and non-parametric statistics of Chi-square are to be used to test the hypotheses at 0.05 level of significance. Up to date, the health centres have been visited twice to make on-the-spot assessment and to interact with the patients and health providers in those centres. The following health centres were visited: Iroko Primary Health Centre, Ijaye Primary Health Centre, Ojoo Primary Health Centre, Fiditi Primary Health Centre Saki Primary Health Centre and Ogbomoso Primary Health Centre. Questionnaire forms are already prepared and these include the questionnaire for staff (doctors and nurses), the structured questionnaire for lactating mothers. The distribution of the questionnaire forms have started with the help of five trained research assistants in each of the health centres sampled.

2. The Level of Awareness of Students of Federal College of Education (Special) Oyo About the Spread and Prevention of AIDS.

the study seeks to find the level of awareness of students of Federal College of Education (Special) Oyo about the spread and prevention of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). The research employs the descriptive survey research design. Four related hypotheses were formulated for testing using variables such as outbreak signs and symptoms, behaviour leading to higher risk and ways of preventing the disease. Stratified random sampling technique was used to select 200 participants from four schools, namely Arts and Social Sciences, Sciences, languages and Vocational and Technical Education. While, a self developed questionnaire on a 4-point likert scale is used for data collection. The questionnaire has been administered and collated and the analysis of the data has commenced.

3. Reproductive Health Knowledge and Determinants of Teenage Pregnancy among Selected Female Senior Secondary School Students in Ibadan, Oyo State, Nigeria.

The study is to determine the reproductive health knowledge and determinants of teenage pregnancy among selected female senior secondary school students in Ibadan. Five hypotheses were formulated for testing based on the variables of knowledge of reproductive health, economic reward, sexual coercion, early initiation to sexual act and media influence as determinants of teenage pregnancy. The descriptive research design was used. The population for the study includes all female secondary school students in Ibadan municipality of Oyo State. The study sample comprises six hundred (600) participants. Purposive and random sampling techniques were used to select five female secondary schools out of ten female schools in the five educational zones in Ibadan. The simple random sampling technique was used to proportionally select the six hundred students. The sample consists of students from SS1 to SS3 who are within 13-19 years age bracket. From each school, one hundred and twenty (120) students were randomly selected on the basis of forty (40) participants per class in SS1, SS2 and SS3. the research instrument for the study is a self-structured questionnaire with dichotomous response format of 'Yes' or 'No'. the statistics of frequencies and percentages will be used to analyze the demographic information, while inferential statistics of Chi-square will be used to test all formulated hypotheses at 0.05 alpha level. The

questionnaire has been distributed with the help of 10 research assistants. Data analysis is been done at the moment.
